# Letter From Our Executive Director



In March last year, a single data point – an anomaly in satellite imagery that our analysts recognized as a deceptive ship-to-ship transfer – led to the discovery of a new supertanker carrying sanctioned Iranian oil. That revelation unraveled global networks of vessels carrying over \$30 billion

in sanctioned oil, and led to the identification of the handful of critical nodes enabling the shady flag registration systems behind these operations. International enforcement actions, vessel interceptions, regulatory adjustments, and maritime industry policy changes followed.

This is what C4ADS does. We're in the business of defeating networks most people don't even know exist, using strategies built for the 21st-century operational environment. Combining elite analytical capabilities with purpose-built technology and a global coalition of partners across government, the private sector, and civil society, C4ADS doesn't just identify threats; we architect and implement strategies to dismantle their underlying systems with relentless, coordinated pressure applied at scale.

This past year demonstrated what the C4ADS model can achieve. Working across more than 40 countries with over 200 partnerships, our analysis disrupted more than \$363 million in illicit financial flows, including 71 sanction designations and the seizure of more than 17.5 tons of illicit products. We mapped Iranian drone-production networks arming Russia's war machine, exposed chemical weapons use in Darfur, revealed that 75 percent of Indonesia's critical nickel refining capacity is controlled by Chinese stakeholders, and used mobile phone geolocation data to prove Myanmar's junta profits from human trafficking in scam compounds.

But tactical victories only matter if they drive systemic change. By exposing networks, we reveal structural vulnerabilities in supply chains, financial systems, corporate ownership structures, and transport infrastructure. Our global coalition then acts on what we uncover: Enforcement agencies pursue prosecutions, private companies

implement stronger safeguards, journalists write hard-hitting stories, and donors guide capital toward strategic data-driven solutions.

And we factor in that our adversaries will react. After our investigations, smuggling routes get more expensive; shell companies become harder to hide behind; criminal networks shift to costlier methods. We observe and track these changes to system behavior to keep tightening the noose. Illegal fishing squid fleets transition away from ports in Peru as inspections improve, wildlife traffickers avoid jurisdictions deemed "high-risk" following seizures, and scam centers change their modus operandi following successful raids. This forced evolution is proof that we're not just creating setbacks for bad actors, we are reshaping the illicit operational environment itself.

None of this happens without the coalition that makes C4ADS what it is. To the more than 200 partner organizations who trusted us with sensitive investigations last year and the donors who bet on a different model for global security: Thank you. In 2026, we will continue building on your support, taking on AI-enabled fraud in Southeast Asia, the emerging China-Iran-Russia-North Korea military nexus, and the explosion of illegal fisheries devastating coastal communities worldwide. For those not yet in our coalition: If you share our conviction that transnational threats can be not just studied, but systematically defeated, come join us. Illicit networks operate as systems. Our coalition fights them the same way.

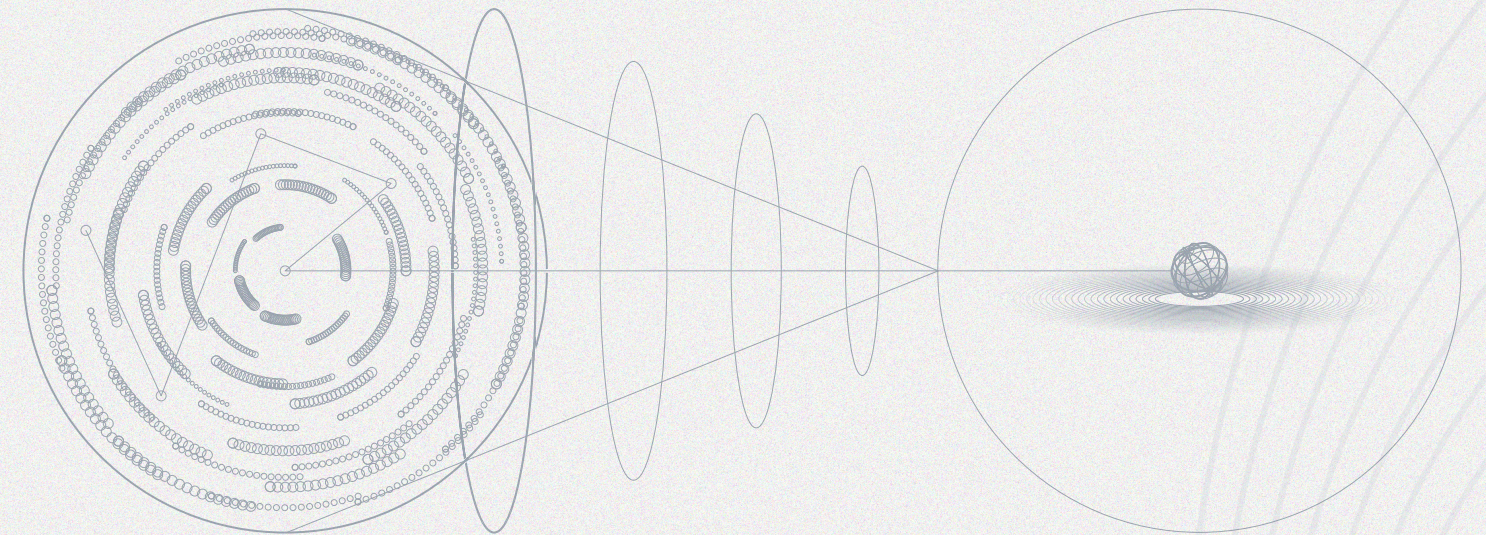
# Charting Our Path Forward

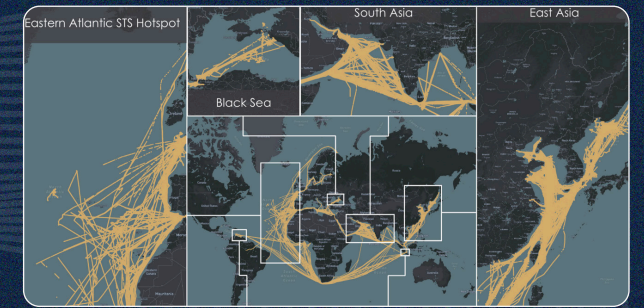
## Staying Afloat: Uncovering the Networks Enabling the Distant Water Squid Fishing Fleet



This public webinar, hosted in collaboration with Eloy Aroni of ArtisOnal, outlined the findings and calls to action of C4ADS' publication Keeping the Lights On. C4ADS analysts discussed the systems that enable the distant water squid fleet to evade and exploit enforcement actions, the labor conditions on board distant water squid vessels, and ways to address these issues.

## The Hidden Hand at the Helm: Tracing Ultimate Beneficial Ownership Networks in Maritime Investigations

This closed-door event and networking happy hour brought together stakeholders from the public and private sectors focusing on both IUU fishing and maritime sanctions evasion. C4ADS analysts highlighted work from two of our publications – Oil and Water and Keeping the Lights On – to explain how targeting ultimate beneficial owners (UBOs) can help address enforcement and sanctions gaps.



## Mining for Influence: Mapping China's Control Over Critical Mineral Supply Chains



This closed-door event and networking happy hour collaboration with Wirescreen and The Wire brought together stakeholders from the public and private sectors to open dialogue on critical mineral supply chains. C4ADS spotlighted insights from our publication Refining Power, as well as our work on lithium supply chains and their hidden connections to the Chinese Defense Industrial Base.

## OSINT UK Fireside Chat

C4ADS analyst Michael Di Girolamo joined OSINT UK for a virtual fireside chat outlining his work on scam centers in Southeast Asia, as featured in his Hot Lines commentary. Michael and OSINT UK's Aaron Roberts unpacked the human trafficking elements of scam centers and the methodologies that C4ADS has used to uncover their activities.

Whether they are investigative journalists, law enforcement groups, or due diligence practitioners, we aim to provide partners with actionable insights that they can use in their daily workflows to identify illicit and malign activity more easily and effectively.

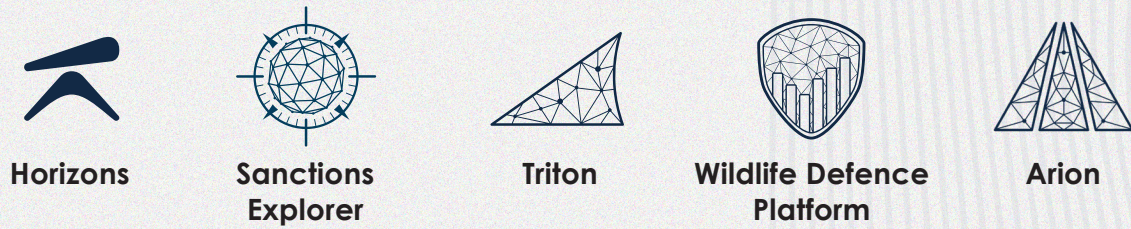

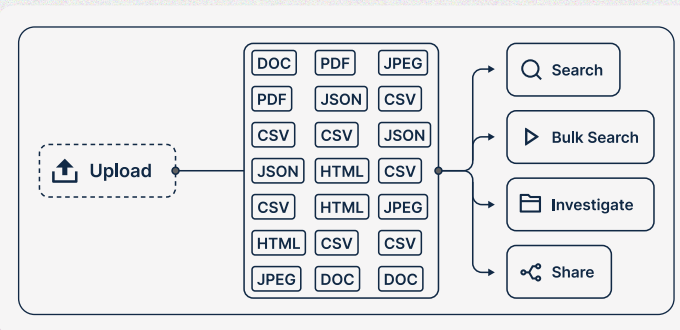

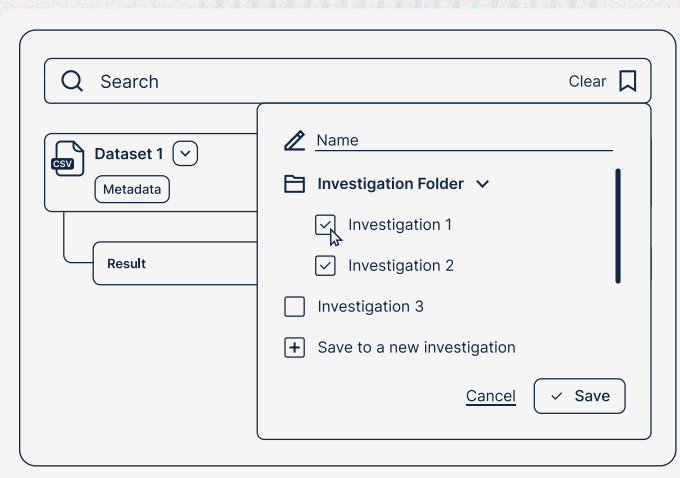
## Introducing Horizons

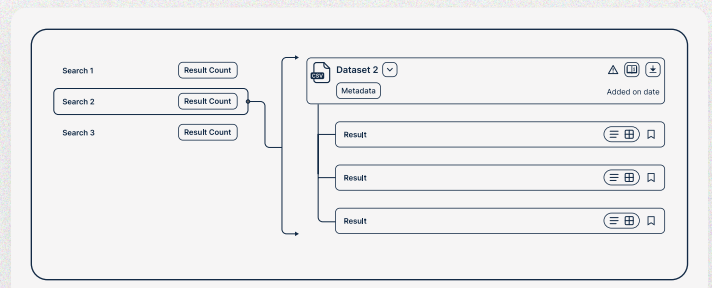

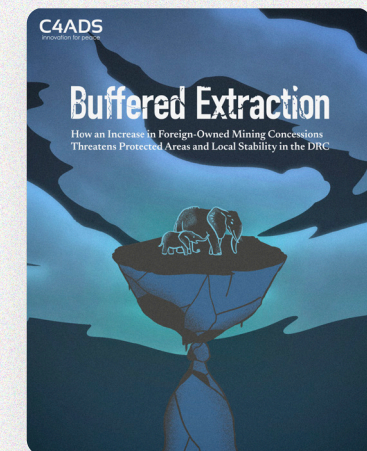
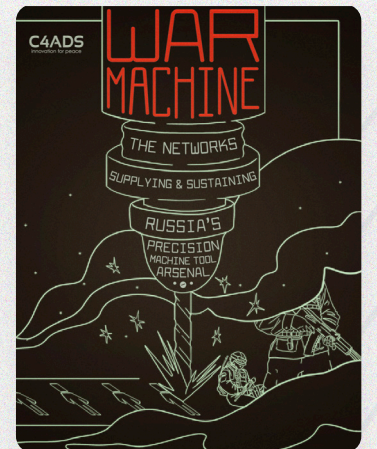

# Public Investigations

## Quantifying Foreign Control of the Indonesian Nickel Sector

Refining Power provided the first quantified analysis of foreign dominance in Indonesia's nickel sector, revealing that Chinese companies control over 75 percent of refining capacity critical. The report generated 416 media mentions reaching 1.24 billion people – including via features in Reuters and major trade publications – and was cited extensively in Transparency International Australia's October 2025 case study, informing policy debates about supply chain security as governments and automakers grapple with strategic dependence on Chinese-controlled infrastructure for clean energy transitions.

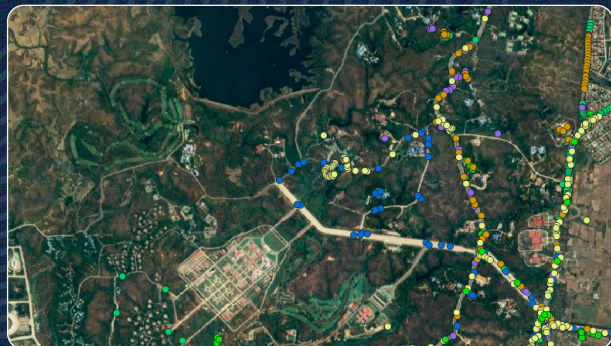


## The Deal to Localize Iranian Drone Production in Russia



Airborne Axis exposed how Iran enabled Russia to produce 5,500+ drones monthly, fundamentally transforming Moscow's strike capabilities in Ukraine. By revealing the \$104 million gold payment system, UAE intermediaries, and technology transfer mechanisms behind this partnership, the investigation – which reached 817 million people across 90+ media mentions – informed policymakers that Iran and Russia must be understood as interdependent actors rather than isolated threats, fundamentally reshaping strategic assessments of sanctions effectiveness and military cooperation between sanctioned states.

## Myanmar Scam Centers Tied to the Junta



Hot Lines provided the first data-driven evidence contradicting denials from Myanmar's junta of scam center complicity, using phone geolocation to track devices between trafficking compounds and government buildings in Naypyidaw. By documenting these connections, the investigation exposed state enablement of industrial-scale fraud operations responsible for billions in annual losses, informing human rights accountability efforts and demonstrating how novel investigative methodologies can prove what traditional intelligence cannot.

## The Gold Supply Chains Fueling Sudan's Civil War

Bullion for Bullets revealed how both Sudanese warring parties generate revenue from mining operations largely untouched by sanctions, tracing the chemical supply chains and export routes that enable this revenue. This report demonstrated why targeting gold exports alone fails without addressing the precursor chemicals, transit routes, and financial networks sustaining Sudan's war economy. Shortly after publication of this report, the largest recipient of conflict-affected Sudanese gold (the UAE) stopped accepting Sudanese gold in gold markets due to the potential for conflict financing.



## Firearms Diversion in Guatemala

End-User Unknown traced how legally imported firearms from major manufacturers are diverted into Guatemala's criminal networks, mapping diversion pathways through government, commercial, and civilian actors. Produced alongside Global Rights Compliance, Diálogos, and Fundación Myrna Mack and published bilingually to reach regional stakeholders, the report exposed gaps in firearms enforcement that may enable violence in a country where handguns dominate crime. This report provided actionable recommendations for Guatemalan authorities and international manufacturers to close loopholes that allow legal weapons to fuel criminal operations.



## The Support Networks Behind IUU Fishing



Keeping the Lights On revealed that 69 percent of squid vessels operating in South American waters share ownership with high-risk operators and mapped the port agents, tankers, and offshore bases enabling months-long illegal operations. By exposing these support systems – instead of looking exclusively at fishing vessels themselves – our investigation informed enforcement right as Peru's crackdown displaced 80+ vessels to Chile, demonstrating why targeting individual boats fails without dismantling the infrastructure of enablers that allows illegal fishing to continue undetected and labor abuses to remain concealed. Featured in Newsweek, among other publications, this report reached an estimated 13.1 million people last year.

# Partner Collaboration

Transnational threats demand cross-sector responses. C4ADS connects government enforcement, private sector compliance, and civil society investigation to turn isolated efforts into coordinated action.

In 2025, we partnered with over 300 organizations across more than 40 countries. Each of these partnerships demonstrates our impact model: elite analysis combined with purpose-built technology, deployed through trusted collaborations that multiply impact across sectors and borders.

## Identifying Beneficial Owners Behind the Dark Fleet



Our partnership with the Financial Times (FT) allowed us to combine our own beneficial ownership mapping and maritime intelligence with their trademark brand of investigative journalism and global reach, informing an investigation into the “Protean Fleet” – a China-based network of 56 supertankers that moved over 400 million barrels of illicit crude oil worth nearly \$35 billion since 2019. FT journalists traced financial flows across jurisdictions while C4ADS mapped the corporate structures connecting Ocean Glory Giant to \$750 million in naval mortgages and UAE intermediaries, ultimately generating a story that landed in several key outlets and reached upwards of 17 million people.

## Exposing Semiconductor Smuggling Networks

Eastern European journalists possessed on-the-ground access and local intelligence in Belarus, Lithuania, and Ukraine; C4ADS brought corporate network mapping and sanctions expertise. The Belarusian Investigative Center, 15min.lt, iStories, and Radio Free Europe’s “Schemes” combined multi-jurisdictional data in a collaborative analytical investigation. to trace a plasma etching tool from Taiwan through Belarus to sanctioned Russian manufacturers, exposing the Izovac Group’s exploitation of the refurbished equipment market – a vulnerability none of these entities could have fully documented alone. Our final Etch and Release report ultimately reached 9.16 million people across 18 different targeted media outlets.



## Hong Kong Dataset Preservation



As the Hong Kong civic space continued to contract, C4ADS combined our data and technical capabilities with local organizations’ understanding of which disappearing datasets were worth saving to preserve key information involving human rights documentation and investigative accountability. Working alongside these partners, we collected and structured seven critical datasets through Horizons in 2025, including asset disclosures we modeled and shared within 24 hours of release. This partnership combines local knowledge of what’s at risk with the technical capacity that can ensure data survives for key decision-makers and investigators.

## Protected Area Management Capacity Building

Since 2021, C4ADS has worked to combine our wildlife trafficking intelligence and investigative methodologies with the frontline expertise and enforcement capacity that only African conservation authorities and prosecutors can bring. Our July 2025 breakthrough – training national authorities alongside environmental prosecutors – succeeded by connecting the rangers who document wildlife crime with the prosecutors who build cases. C4ADS equipped both with intelligence that makes their existing expertise more effective at disrupting trafficking networks.



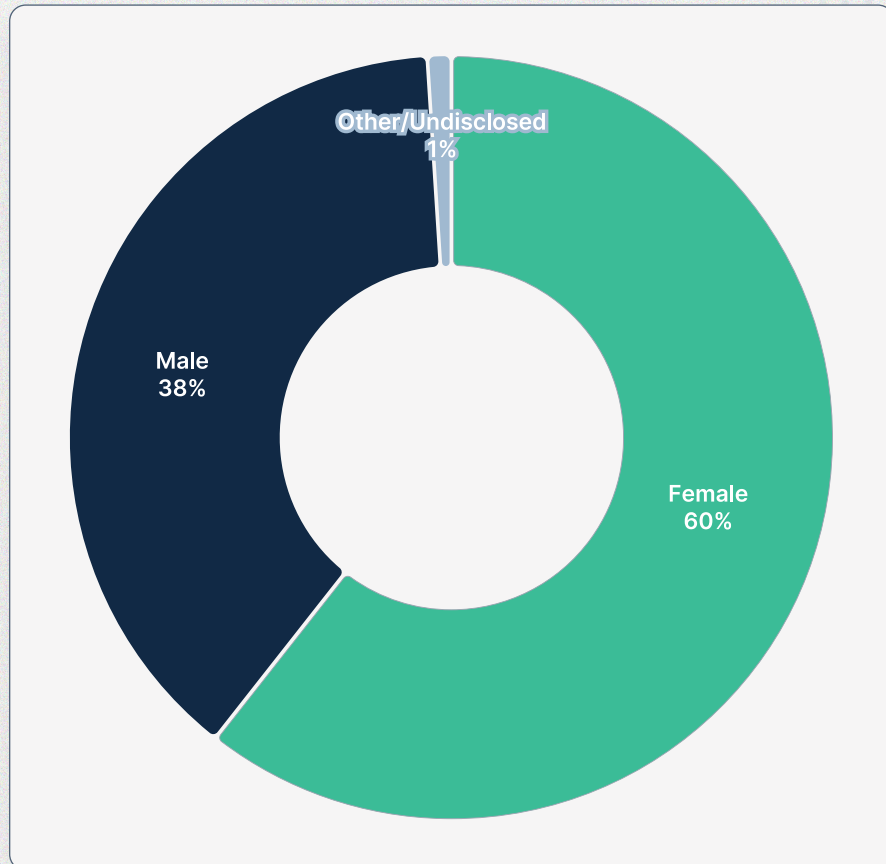
## Combating Illegal, Unreported, and Unregulated Fishing



The Joint Analytical Cell combines distinct capabilities: Global Fishing Watch’s vessel tracking, Skylight’s maritime domain awareness, TMT and the IMCS Network’s MSC expertise and C4ADS’ beneficial ownership mapping. Integrating our Triton platform with Skylight created a tool none of us could build alone – connecting vessel movements with corporate structures behind them. JAC partnerships also give C4ADS direct channels to fisheries authorities, at-sea operations where our analysis informs interdictions, and enforcement conversations where beneficial ownership transparency becomes policy priority. This coalition transforms individual strengths into comprehensive enforcement capability.

# Our People

At C4ADS, people are our gold. Our team brings diverse expertise from across disciplines and backgrounds, united by a commitment to creative problem-solving and analytic rigor.



C4ADS collectively speaks **30+ languages**, including but not limited to: Albanian, Arabic, Bengali, Danish, French, German, Greek, Hindi, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Mandarin Chinese, Persian/Farsi, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, Swahili, Turkish, Ukrainian, Uyghur, Uzbek.

Our staff comes from across the United States and has significant international experience living and studying across Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, the Middle East, and beyond.

## Creating Culture

We strive to foster a culture where excellence, collaboration, and mutual support enable our people to do their best work. Our employee-driven resource groups create an environment where everyone can thrive and contribute their unique perspectives. Our Leadership Advisory Group and Leadership Committee ensure staff have direct input into organizational strategy, connecting frontline insights with institutional priorities.

## Creating Culture

By empowering and investing in our team, we harness the collective expertise needed to disrupt illicit networks operating across complex, interconnected systems. When our team succeeds, our partners succeed – and the global security community becomes stronger.

C4ADS's annual \$4,500 educational stipend remains one of our most strategic investments in organizational capacity. In 2025, we invested **over \$25,000** in employee education, with more than **27% of staff** pursuing certifications, degrees, and specialized training directly aligned with our mission. Employees enhanced skills in data analytics, investigative methodologies, and professional writing, while others strengthened language proficiency – expanding our ability to analyze foreign-language data and engage effectively with partners across diverse regions.

Our team's commitment to professional development extended beyond formal education. Staff attended specialized conferences including **SleuthCon, Cyber WarCon, the Conference for Applied Machine Learning, and HEFAT civil unrest training** – ensuring C4ADS remains at the forefront of investigative techniques, emerging technologies, and operational security practices that strengthen our analytical edge.



# Board of Directors

Our Board of Directors provides essential guidance and governance in support of the C4ADS mission. 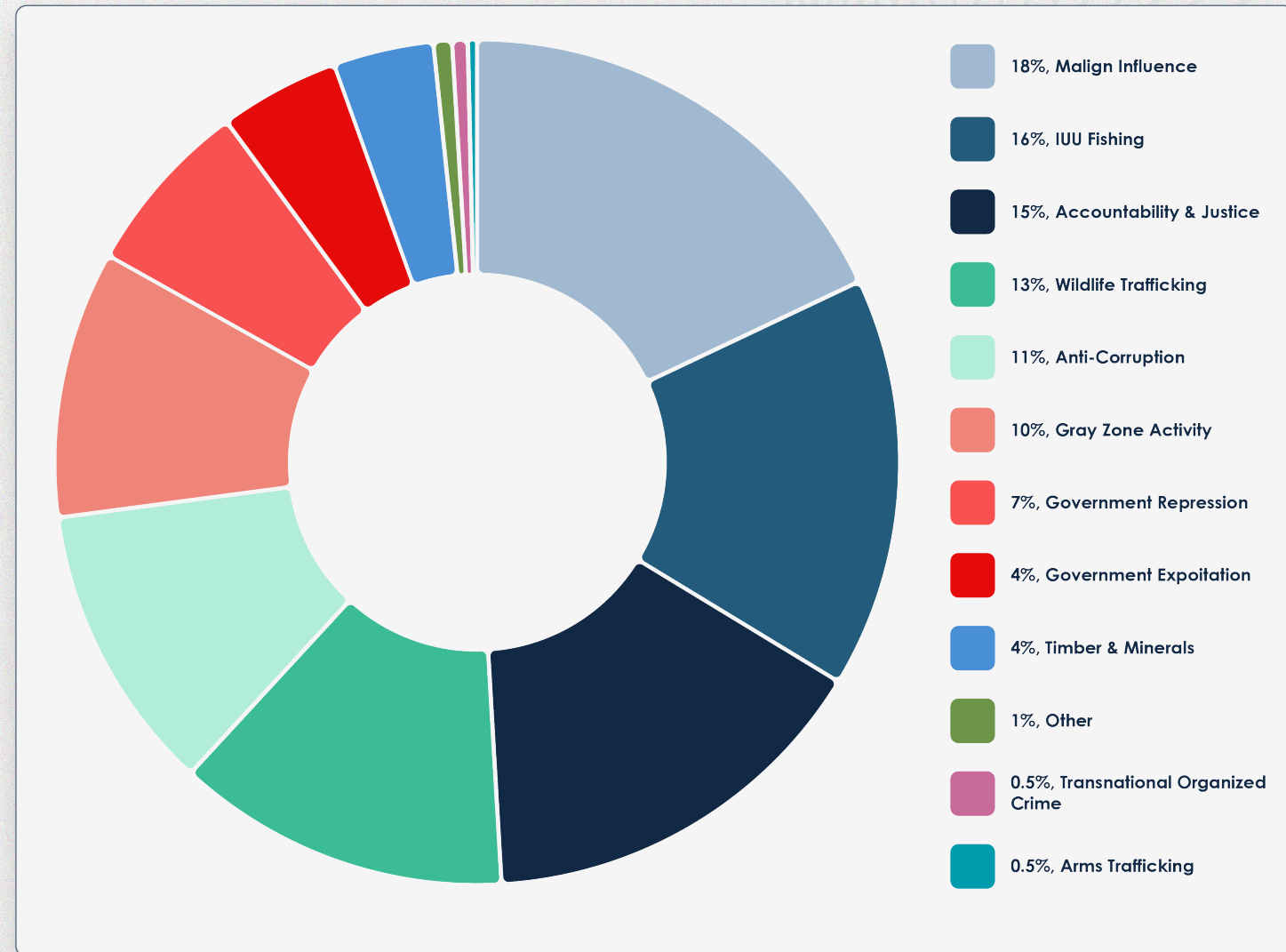
